What we already know: We know the name of the school, the village/town it is in and the name of the road that the school is on. We know that there are many countries in the world. Begin to know that maps show us where things are. I can make simple maps/sketches of their immediate environment, or maps from imaginary story settings they are familiar with.

What's next?

In Year 3, pupils will go on to name and locate counties and cities of the United Kingdom, geographical regions and their identifying human and physical characteristics, they will locate key topographical features (including hills, mountains, coasts and rivers), and land-use patterns; and understand how some of these aspects have changed over time. They will use their knowledge of the 8 compass directions and use this knowledge to locate counties and regions on a map

Geographical questions: What is the difference between land and sea? Is the United Kingdom (UK) one country? Which individual characteristics of a country are most important? Is a capital city a good place to live and why? Is the climate in the UK always the same?
